THE MAGIC LANTERN WITHIN

These are some more slides that feature magic lanterns as part of the image. Please keep sending in any slides you have with images of magic lanterns, slides or peepshows.





In keeping with the season, **Helmut Wälde** has sent this chromolithographic children's glass slide made by Ernst Plank, Nürnberg, in about 1900 and measuring 5 x 18 cm.



Patrice Guérin's long slide is hand painted and marketed by the Lapierre House circa 1870. The label translates as 'No.1 Little French jokes' and we see a lantern showman, a caged rabbit and two grotesque characters talking.



This slide (the top image shows a detail) from **Helmut Wälde** was made in the Musschenbroek workshop in the first quarter of the 18th century (for similar frames see p.6 of Dutch Perspectives by Willem Albert Wagenaar, Annet Duller and Margreet Wagenaar-Fischer, MLS, 2014). The oak frame with pointed top and bottom edges measures 14.7 x 39.5 cm. The diameter of the handpainted glasses is 5.5 cm. The titles are scratched in the black parts of the paintings and read: 'Toverlantaren' (=magic lantern), 'fraay karjeùs' (=beautiful(?) curiosity) and 'lantaren sonder ligt' (lantern without light(?)).



Patrice Guérin has also sent this slipping slide of a lanternist projecting a familiar scene – a windmill.
