Mitsue Ikeda-Tanaka writes that, after a long pause, a new Nishiki Kage-e (magic lantern) project has started - a partnership between the curators of culturallysignificant property and her Ikeda-qumi performers. The aim is to recreate "the world of traditional performing art, Nishiki Kage-e in an old Japanese-style private house." In the project they are looking for future magic lantern artists and those who participate will practise during the year with the Ikeda-gumi volunteers. On the first day of the project, 10 June, Mitsue gave a talk about magic lanterns and Ikedagumi performed a show at the historic former Ueda family residence in Yao City, Osaka (in next issue). The answer is Great Britain's King George IV (1762-1830) on 19 July 1821. George had already been Regent for 18 years during his father, George III's, period of 'madness'. George IV is well known for over-eating and over-drinking but he was a man of style and taste. You will not see his estranged wife Caroline of Brunswick here – she was locked out of the coronation.
